

Introduction

Occupational Employment and Wage Estimates for the Lewiston-Auburn Metropolitan Area 3rd Quarter 2009 is a special report designed to estimate current wage rates by occupation in the Lewiston-Auburn area. The data contained herein are based on the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey, aged forward from May 2008 to produce current estimates.

The OES program categorizes jobs into the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC), used nationwide by federal agencies responsible for occupational analysis. Over 800 detailed occupations comprise 22 major occupational groups. This table contains 295 detailed occupations that meet the requirements for publication, plus the 22 SOC major groups and an all occupation aggregate for the Lewiston-Auburn area.

The current OES data set is based on the May 2008 survey. The data set consists of the May 2008, November 2007, May 2007, November 2006, May 2006, and November 2005 OES survey panels. **Wage estimates are benchmarked to third quarter 2009** by applying the Employment Cost Index (ECI) for each ECI occupational group processed in the statistical software used by our office.

The Employment Cost Index (ECI) is developed by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. It is a quarterly measure of changes in labor costs, and is one of the principal economic indicators used by the Federal Reserve Bank.

1. It shows changes in wages and salaries and benefit costs, as well as changes in total compensation
2. It presents data as a total for all workers and separately for private industry and for State and local government workers
3. It reports compensation changes by industry, occupational group, union and nonunion status, and region
4. It provides seasonally adjusted and unadjusted data
5. The ECI provides historical data on changes in labor costs
6. The ECI uses fixed weights to control for shifts among occupations and industries

The ECI series used in benchmarking the data contained in this table is private industry, wages and salaries, not seasonally adjusted.

Explanation of the Data Elements

SOC Code

The Standard Occupational Classification code identifies each occupation. It is useful for obtaining additional information from O*Net, the Occupational Outlook Handbook, America's Career One-Stop, or other sources of occupational information.

Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) Title

The occupational title assigned to the classification.

Employment

Three columns that estimate employment by occupation in the Lewiston-Auburn Metropolitan Area, Maine Statewide, followed by a percentage estimate showing employment concentration in the Lewiston-Auburn Metropolitan Area. Employment estimates are benchmarked to the average employment of November 2007 and May 2008.

Mean (Average)

This figure is the weighted average. It is the estimated total wages for an occupation divided by its weighted employment.

Lev I (Entry)

Derived by calculating the mean (average) of the lower third of the population.

Lev II (Exp)

This is the mean (average) of the upper two-thirds of the population.

10th, 25th, 50th (Median), 75th, and 90th Percentiles

The percentiles represent the wage range from low to high, excluding statistical outliers. At the 10th percentile, 10 percent of an occupation earn less than the reported figure while 90 percent earn more. At the 50th percentile, half earn less and half earn more. At the 90th percentile 90 percent earn less and 10 percent earn more. The 25th and 75th percentiles represent the mid-range in that half of those in a reported occupation earn within this range.

Sample

The sampling frame for the May 2008 OES survey was the 2nd Quarter 2007 Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) Report covered by the Maine Employment Security Law. Owners of unincorporated firms (sole proprietorships and partnerships) and those who are self-employed were excluded. Data on occupational employment and wages are collected from employers of every size in all areas of the state and in all industry divisions. The Lewiston-Auburn sample consisted of 166 establishments (after adjusting for out-of-business units) representing 5,199 workers. Of these, we received usable responses from 124 establishments (74.70 percent) representing 3,938 workers (75.75 percent).

Wage Collection

Wages for the OES survey are straight-time, gross pay, exclusive of premium pay. **Included** are base rate, cost-of-living allowances, longevity pay, guaranteed pay, hazardous-duty pay, incentive pay including commissions and production bonuses, tips, and on-call pay. **Excluded** are back pay, jury duty pay, overtime pay, severance pay, shift differentials, nonproduction bonuses, profit sharing, attendance, holiday and year-end bonuses, and tuition reimbursements.

Data Limitations

The wage ranges used in the OES program are open-ended at both the lower and upper spectrum, the lowest range being less than \$7.50 per hour and the highest range being \$80.00 and over per hour. The lowest range has a low boundary equal to the state's minimum wage, which was \$7.00 as of the May 2008 reference period. The highest wage range is open-ended at \$80.00 and over per hour. Percentile values over \$70.00 per hour are not published.

There are several possible reasons why certain data elements do not appear in the tables:

Data for percentile values over \$70.00 per hour (\$145,600 per year) are not provided. An asterisk (*) denotes that a wage estimate is not available.

Some employment estimates have been determined to be unreliable due to relative errors greater than 50 percent, or for other reasons. In these instances, an asterisk (*) appears in the employment estimate field, to denote that this estimate is not available.

Data that do not meet statistical validity or publication standards are not provided.
